Hermitage Announces New Programs in February and March featuring Leading Artists and Award Winners in Theater, Music, Visual Art, and Literature

These unique and engaging Hermitage programs are presented throughout Sarasota County and offer Gulf Coast audiences a rare 'sneak peek' into the creative process with some of the world's leading writers, composers, playwrights, and more. Some of the newly announced artists include Hermitage Major Theater Award Winner Madeleine George (Hulu's "Only Murders in the Building"), recipient of the Hermitage Prize in Composition at the Aspen Music Festival and School Sofía Rocha, innovative vocalist and spoken-word artist Fay Victor, and Tony Award-winning producer Tom Kirdahy.

(December 12, 2022) — **The Hermitage Artist Retreat** (Sarasota County, Florida) today announced new programs for February and March of 2023. These events will be presented on the Hermitage's historic beachfront campus on Manasota Key and throughout Sarasota County. Hermitage programs introduce world-renowned artists to Florida's Gulf Coast community for candid and engaging conversations, musical performances, play readings, work-in-process showings, and educational opportunities for students and adults.

Newly announced February and March programs include continuing partnerships with ASALH (Association for the Study of African-American Life and History), Asolo Repertory Theatre, and the Town of Longboat Key, among others. New partnerships include a collaboration with Venice Symphony and the Pops Orchestra, as well as Fogartyville Community Media and Arts Center. Featured artists and performers include Hermitage Major Theater Award winner **Madeleine George**, Tony and Olivier

Award-winning producer **Tom Kirdahy**, Hermitage Prize in Composition at the Aspen Music Festival and School recipient **Sofía Rocha**, multidisciplinary artist **Shannon Finnegan**, acclaimed pianist and composer **Conrad Tao**, acclaimed author **Daniel Gumbiner**, award-winning theater maker **Don Nguyen**, groundbreaking jazz vocalist **Fay Victor**, playwright and screenwriter **Stacey Rose**, percussionist **Lesley Mok**, performer and teaching artist **Tamara Anderson**, and internationally exhibited visual artist **B. Ingrid Olson**.

The aforementioned artists coming in February and March join previously announced Hermitage programs in December and January. The final program of 2022, "Notes: On Writing and Music," features author **Chigozie Obioma**, one of only a few novelists to have all their works shortlisted for the Booker Prize in Fiction, alongside composer, electronic instrument creator, and percussionist **Levy Lorenzo**. This event will be on Thursday, December 15 at 5pm on the Hermitage Beach, presented in partnership with the Johann Fust Library Foundation.

The Hermitage's 20th Anniversary Season continues in January with programs spanning genre and presented throughout Sarasota County as well as online. "Distinction and Unity," a multidisciplinary event featuring genre-bending author **DaMaris B. Hill**, composer and performer **Molly Joyce**, and visual artist **Kenneth Tam** takes place on the Hermitage Beach on Friday, January 6 at 5pm. On Thursday, January 12 at 5pm, "Violin and Voice" unites violinist, arts leader, and frequent Beyoncé collaborator Lady Jess with the poignant and humorous words of awardwinning playwright Terry Guest, previously seen by Sarasota audiences at Urbanite Theater and as part of the "Hermitage Sunsets @ Selby Gardens" series. The Hermitage returns to Bookstore1 in Sarasota on Friday, January 20 at 6pm for "Man V. Nature: The Art of the Story Collection," featuring Hermitage Fellow and author **Diane Cook** whose debut publication garnered critical acclaim and is described by *goodreads* as having "perfect rhythm and unyielding brutality." Playwright and theater director Kareem Fahmy kicks off the Hermitage's 2023 "Artists and Thinkers" series with "Kareem Fahmy's Distinct Society," presented virtually on Monday, January 23 at 5pm ET, only a few days before the play's world premiere production. Lastly in January, "Shariffa Ali: Roots, Routes, and Rhythm" features Hermitage Major Theater Award

Winner **Shariffa Ali** with an update on her in-process commission; this event is part of the "Hermitage Sunsets @ Selby Gardens" series and will be presented on Thursday, January 26 at 5pm.

The newly announced programs in February and March begin with "The Art of Producing," part of the Hermitage "Artists and Thinkers" series and the third in a cycle of popular conversations with Tony and Olivier Award-winning producer **Tom Kirdahy**. Kirdahy is great champion of new work and a friend to the Hermitage. This event is presented in collaboration with the Town of Longboat Key, where Mr. Kirdahy resides part of the year, as well as Asolo Repertory Theater where his work was recently seen on stage with *Hood: A Robinhood Musical*. This candid conversation between Kirdahy and fellow Tony Award winner **Andy Sandberg**, Artistic Director and CEO of the Hermitage, will offer insight into the often-hidden role a producer plays in bringing shows to life on Broadway, Off-Broadway, and London's West End, as well as the touring and regional market. Presented at Longboat Key's Bayfront Park as the sun sets over Sarasota Bay on Friday, February 3 at 5pm.

"Mastering the Monologue," with theater maker **Don Nguyen**, is a masterclass on the often-tricky task of writing and performing a monologue. Presented in collaboration with New College of Florida on Friday, February 17 at 5pm, this intimate engagement at the New College campus in Sarasota provides a rare opportunity to observe both the performance of theatrical text and a dissection of its inner workings. A recipient of the New York Stage and Film Founder's Award, Don Nguyen is a multifaceted artist whose plays are "intriguing and empathetic" (Seattle Times) with "a genuine sweetness" (The New York Times).

"Jazz and Theater: Keeping the Beat" reunites the Hermitage with the Manasota chapter of ASALH at the Fogartyville Community Media and Arts Center to present Jazz vocalist **Fay Victor** and playwright **Stacey Rose**. Presented at Fogartyville's hybrid indoor-outdoor space on Thursday February 23 at 5pm, this program combines the unparalleled stylings of Fay Victor with the biting wit of Stacey Rose. With her scat stylings recognized by *The New York Times* as "her own hybrid of song and spoken word," Fay Victor will share improvisatory work and speak about her career as a musical artist breaking boundaries. With a focus on "life as the other," playwright and

screenwriter Stacey Rose's work has been seen on stages and screens across the United States including Barrington Stage, Rattlestick Playwrights Theater in New York, and Fox's 9-1-1.

On Thursday, March 2 at 5:30pm, Tamara Anderson, Lesley Mok, and B. Ingrid Olson put the Hermitage's multidisciplinary mission on display with "Tell and Show: Art and Performance Expressing Identity." Working across different mediums but all using material from their own lives to inform the substance of their craft, each will share work and discuss their artistic process. **Tamara Anderson** has been seen on stage and screen and celebrated for her charm, humor, and impressive vocals. **Lesley Mok**'s innovative and dynamic compositions have been performed by such leading ensembles as the International Contemporary Ensemble, Metropolis Ensemble, and JACK Quartet. Visual artist **B. Ingrid Olson**'s works have been exhibited around the world including the MoMa in New York, Harvard's Carpenter Center, the Aspen Art Museum, and i8 Gallery in Reykjavík.

Hermitage Major Theater Award Winner **Madeleine George** has a gift for delivering a powerful message in a joyous package, which she will speak about with Hermitage audiences in "Comedy and Community" on Friday, March 10 at 5:30pm. Like her work on Hulu's hit television series "**Only Murders in the Building**," or her plays *Hurricane Diane* and the Pulitzer Prize finalist *The (Curious Case of the) Watson Intelligence*, her commission-in-process promises to tackle cultural and systemic mores all in the high stakes world of amateur bowling. With her unique blend of comedy and heart, George will share prior work and discuss her goals for the new HMTA commission, as well as how she hopes it will help to build and enhance a sense of community.

Sofía Rocha, the 2022 recipient of the Hermitage Prize in Composition presented at the Aspen Music Festival and School, shares her original musical compositions as part of the Hermitage "Sunsets @ Selby Gardens" series in "Making Musical Waves." Rocha, no stranger to Florida having grown up in Naples, has studied and presented work across the United States with noted ensembles such as JACK Quartet, DeCoda, loadbang, and Brentano String Quartet, among others. For this musical program on Thursday, March 16 at 6:30pm, the Hermitage is partnering with

the Venice Symphony and the Pops Orchestra to offer live performances of this next-generation composer's nuanced and evocative work, all with unique insights from the creator, set against the backdrop of the botanical gardens. This season of "Hermitage Sunsets @ Selby Gardens" is sponsored in part by *Scene Magazine*.

Chigozie Obioma

Hermitage Fellow **Chigozie Obioma** was born in Akure, Nigeria. His two novels, *The Fishermen* (2015) and *An Orchestra of Minorities* (2019), were shortlisted for The Booker Prize, making him one of only two novelists to be shortlisted for multiple works. They have won awards including the inaugural FT/Oppenheimer Award for Fiction, the NAACP Image Award and the LA Times Book Prize, and been nominated for many others. His

books have been translated into more than 29 languages. *The Fishermen* was adapted into an award-winning stage play by Gbolahan Obisesan that played in the UK and South Africa between 2018-2019. He was named one of Foreign Policy's "100 Leading Global Thinkers of 2015." His works have been published in *The Guardian, VQR, Paris Review, New York Times*, and elsewhere. He is the James E. Ryan Associate Professor of Creative Writing at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and divides his time between the US and Nigeria. ChigozieObioma.com

Levy Lorenzo

Born in Bucharest, Filipino-American **Levy Marcel Ingles Lorenzo**, **Jr.** works at the intersection of music, art, and technology. On an international scale, his body of work spans custom electronics design, sound engineering, instrument building, installation art, free improvisation, and classical percussion. With a primary focus on inventing new instruments, he prototypes, composes, and performs new electronic music. Lorenzo's work has been featured at MoMA PS1, MIT Media Lab, STEIM, pitchfork.com, BBC, Burning Man, and *The New York Times* which named him an "electronics wizard." A core member of the acclaimed International Contemporary Ensemble, he fulfills multiple roles as sound designer, electronics performer, and percussionist. Other performance engagements include Claire Chase's *Density 2036* project, and the Peter Evans Ensemble. DaMaris B. Hill

Returning Hermitage Fellow **DaMaris B. Hill** is the author of *A Bound Woman Is a Dangerous Thing: The Incarceration of African-American Women from Harriet Tubman to Sandra Bland* (2020 NAACP Image Award nominee for Outstanding Literary Work in Poetry), *The Fluid Boundaries of Suffrage and Jim Crow: Staking Claims in the American Heartland*, Vi-zə-bəl Teks-chərs (Visible Textures). Hill is inspired by the anxieties of our contemporary existence, complicated by fears that certain linear narratives of history fail to be inclusive. "I belong to a generation of people who do not fear death, but are afraid that we may be forgotten," she states. Driven by a keen interest in the work of Toni Morrison and theories regarding 'rememory' as a philosophy and aesthetic practice, Hill uses digital material and critical fabulation research methods to write about "America" and geographic place. Similar to her creative process, Hill's scholarly research is interdisciplinary. Hill is an Associate Professor of Creative Writing at the University of Kentucky. Molly Joyce

Hermitage Fellow **Molly Joyce** has been hailed as one of the "most versatile, prolific, and intriguing composers working under the vast new-music dome" by *The Washington Post*. Her work is concerned with disability as a creative source. She has an impaired left hand from a previous car accident, and the primary vehicle in her pursuit is her electric vintage toy organ, an instrument she bought on eBay which engages her disability on a compositional and performative level. Molly's creative projects have been presented and commissioned by Carnegie Hall, TEDxMidAtlantic, Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden, Bang on a Can Marathon, Danspace Project, Americans for the Arts, National

Sawdust, Gaudeamus Muziekweek, National Gallery of Art, Classical:NEXT, and in Pitchfork, Red Bull Radio, and WNYC's New Sounds. She is a graduate of Juilliard, Royal Conservatory in The Hague, Yale, and alumnus of the YoungArts Foundation. She holds an Advanced Certificate in Disability Studies from City University of New York, and is a doctoral student at the University of Virginia in Composition and Computer Technologies. She has served on the composition faculties of New York University, Wagner College, and Berklee Online.

Kenneth Tam

Hermitage Fellow **Kenneth Tam** works in video, sculpture, installation, and photography, using the male body as a starting point for discussions about performance, physical intimacy and private ritual. Tam received his BFA from the Cooper Union. He has had solo exhibitions at the Minneapolis Institute of Art; MIT List Center for Visual Arts; the Visual Arts Center at UT Austin, Commonwealth and Council, LA; Night Gallery, LA; Queens Museum, NY and at the ICA LA. Tam has participated in group shows at 47 Canal, NY; Hollybush Gardens, London; the Hammer Museum, LA; InPractice at SculptureCenter, Queens, The Shed's Open Call. He has participated in residencies including Artist Lab at 18th Street Arts Center; LMCC Workspace; The Core Residency Program at The Museum of Fine Arts, Houston; Pioneer Works; and at The Kitchen. She is the Artistic Director and lead violinist of the Urban Playground Chamber Orchestra (UPCO) in New York, leads strings under the baton of Darin Atwater's Soulful Symphony in Baltimore, and is a regular session musician in Los Angeles. She is a soloing member of Beyoncé Knowles-Carter's band and has toured with the superstar. Artist credits include collaborations with Stevie Wonder, The Roots, J.Lo, Max Richter, Alicia Keys, Imagine Dragons, Hans Zimmer, Diana Ross, Spike Lee, Miley Cyrus, Stewart Copeland, Terence Blanchard, Jay Z, Solange, and more. She likes to write in a way that considers the whole expressive range of each instrument, often utilizing extreme ranges and dynamic timbres

in her writing as a framework for individuality and personal expression. Her ongoing explorations with composition and improvisation are most notably documented in her nine-piece improvising chamber ensemble, The Living Collection. Madeleine George is the recipient of the Hermitage Major Theater Award. Her plays include Hurricane Diane (Obie Award), The (curious case of the) Watson Intelligence (Pulitzer Prize finalist; Outer Critics Circle John Gassner Award), Seven Homeless Mammoths Wander New England (Susan Smith Blackburn finalist), Precious Little, and The Zero Hour (Jane Chambers Award, Lambda Literary Award finalist). Her work hasbeen performed in New York at Clubbed Thumb, Playwrights Horizons and New York Theatre Workshop, and around the country at Perseverance Theater in Juneau, the Huntington in Boston, the Old Globe in San Diego, Shotgun Players in Berkeley, City Theater in Pittsburgh, Theater Wit in Chicago, and Two River Theater in New Jersey, among many other places. She has been a Banff Arts Centre Resident Artist, a two-time Hedgebrook Writer in Residence, a three-time resident at SPACE on Ryder Farm, and a four-time MacDowell Fellow. She's a member of New Dramatists' Class of 2017, a Clubbed Thumb Writers Group member, and an alum of the Lark Playwrights Workshop, the O'Neill National Playwrights Conference, and the Soho Rep Writer/Director Lab. Honors include the Princess Grace Award, a Manhattan Theater Club Playwriting Fellowship, a Lilly Award, and a Whiting Award for Drama. Madeleine holds a BA from Cornell University and an MFA from NYU. She has taught writing in various forms at Barnard College, Bard College, NYU, Rutgers, the Universities of Michigan, Maryland, Arkansas, Indiana, and Minnesota, and Carnegie Mellon, Columbia, Cornell, and Brown. For many years she led free writing workshops around New York City, including at Queensboro Correctional Facility; Hopper House, an alternative-to-incarceration program for women; a pre-trial intervention program run by the Brooklyn DA; Island Academy, the public school on Rikers Island; a senior citizens group in Fort Greene Park; and the Ali Forney Center, a shelter for homeless LGBTQ youth. Since 2006, she has worked with the Bard Prison Initiative at Bard College, a degree-granting liberal arts program operating in seven New York State prisons. She currently serves as BPI's Director of Admissions. In 2022, Madeleine's translation of Chekhov's *Three Sisters* premiered at Two River Theater, where she recently completed a six-year stint as the Mellon Playwright in Residence. Her ten-episode audio adaptation of Alison Bechdel's comic strip Dykes to Watch Out For is forthcoming in 2023 from Audible Originals. Madeleine is a founding member of the Obie-Award-winning playwrights' collective 13P (www.13p.org). She's written on shows for FX and HBO, and she is currently a writer/producer on the Hulu mystery-comedy Only Murders in the Building, nominated for WGA and Emmy Awards for Best Comedy.

Sofía Rocha

Sofía Rocha, originally from Boulder, Colorado and having grown up in Naples, Florida, is the 2022 recipient of the **Hermitage Prize in Composition** at the Aspen Music Festival and School. Rocha writes music of uncompromising emotional intensity while exploring cognition, randomness, rhythm, and counterpoint within post-tonal frameworks. She writes for all manner of performing forces: instrumental, vocal, and electronic. Upcoming projects include newly commissioned works for the 2022 Aspen Music Festival as a Composition Fellow, the International Contemporary Ensemble, and the Fifth House Ensemble as a Fromm Foundation Fellow at the 2020 Fresh Inc. Festival, Rocha's first orchestral work, Replier, was chosen as the winner of the 2020 New England Philharmonic annual call-for-scores and will be premiered in May of 2022. Rocha has also received honors from ASCAP, OM/NI Composition Competition, and Tenebrae New Music Ensemble. She has worked with numerous ensembles including the Arditti Quartet. JACK Quartet, DeCoda, loadbang, Brentano String Quartet, Castle of our Skins, Transient Canvas, Hypercube, arx duo, and Duo Entre-Nous, as well as numerous solo performers. Rocha received her master's degree in composition from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory as a Chancellor's Scholar and recipient of Elsberry & Gonder Family and Conservatory Scholarships. There, she studied with Chen Yi, Yotam Haber, Paul Rudy and Zhou Long. Rocha was also the 2019 Composer-in-Residence for the Graduate Fellowship String Quartet. She completed her undergraduate work at the Sunderman Conservatory of Music at Gettysburg College in 2019, receiving a BA in Music with Honors as a Wagnild Scholar and studying composition with Avner Dorman. She has attended June in Buffalo, Fresh Inc. Festival, the Atlantic Music Festival, Divergent Studio, and the Hypercube Composition Lab as a composer, studying and taking master classes with composers such as Augusta Read Thomas, Hannah Lash, Hilda Paredes, Jeffrey Mumford, Alex Temple, Richard Danielpour, Aaron Helgeson, Amy Beth Kirsten, and David Serkin Ludwig, among others. Besides composing, Rocha is also an avid trombonist and conductor, having performed with numerous symphony orchestras, wind ensembles, and jazz groups.

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
